Reading

- apply phonic knowledge and skills
- respond speedily with the correct sound to graphemes (letters or groups of letters)
- read accurately by blending sounds in unfamiliar words
- read common exception words
- read words containing taught phonics and -s, -es, -ing, -ed, -er and -est endings
- read words with contractions [for example, I'm, I'll, we'll
- read aloud accurately books that are consistent with their developing phonic knowledge
- re-read these books to build up their fluency and confidence in word reading.
- Develop pleasure in reading, motivation to read, vocabulary and understanding by:
- listening to and discussing a wide range of poems, stories and non-fiction
- being encouraged to link what they read or hear read to their own experiences
- becoming very familiar with key stories, fairy stories and traditional tales, retelling them and considering their particular characteristics
- recognising and joining in with predictable phrases
- learning to appreciate rhymes and poems, and to recite some by heart
- discussing word meanings, linking new meanings to those already known
- Understand both the books they can already read accurately and fluently and those they listen to by:
- drawing on what they already know or on background information and vocabulary provided
- checking that the text makes sense to them as they read
- discussing the significance of the title and events
- making inferences on the basis of what is being said and done
- predicting what might happen on the basis of what has been read so far
- participate in discussion about what is read to them, taking turns and listening to what others say
- explain clearly their understanding of what is read to them

Writing

Write sentences by:

- saying out loud what they are going to write about
- composing a sentence orally before writing it
- sequencing sentences to form short narratives
- re-reading what they have written to check that it makes sense
- discuss what they have written with others
- leaving spaces between words
- joining words and joining clauses using "and"
- beginning to punctuate sentences using a capital letter and a full stop, question mark or exclamation
- using a capital letter for names of people, places, the days of the week, and the personal pronoun 'I'
- Spell:
- · words containing phonics already taught
- common exception words
- the days of the week
- Begin to form lower-case letters in the correct direction, starting and finishing in the right place
- form capital letters

- form digits 0-9
- understand which letters belong to which handwriting 'families' (i.e. letters that are formed in similar ways) and to practise these
- naming the letters of the alphabet in order
- using letter names to distinguish between alternative spellings of the same sound
- add prefixes and suffixes:
- using the spelling rule for adding -s or -es as the plural
- using the prefix un-
- using -ing, -ed, -er and -est
- write from memory simple sentences dictated by an adult
