EYFS:

Nursery Geographers used Digimap to find our school and explore Knebley Crescent and streets nearby. We talked about where we live and how we get to nursery.

We went for a walk around our school exploring what we can find inside and outside our school. We talked about what we can see such as the trees in the peace garden and canal running along the bottom of the playground.


Reception Geographers found Nuneaton on Digimap and looked at what is in the local area such as shops, church and park. They looked closely at Riversley Park in Nuneaton and discussed the features of a park. They then made simple maps of the park.

EYFS Links:

Describe their immediate environment using knowledge from observation, discussion, stories, non-fiction texts and maps.

Talks about what they see using a wide range of vocabulary.

Draw information from a simple map.



<u>Key Stage 1</u>


Year I Geographers used Digimap to plan a route from our school to All Saints Church.

Year 2 geographers navigated where our school is using Digimap and used photographs to compare our school from the past and now.

Lower key Stage 2


Year 4 Geographers sketched a map of their journey from school to the church making a note of any important things and places on the way.


They then made a map from their sketch and added a key!

Upper Key Stage 2

Year 6 Geographers studied the local area over the years. They used a selection of paper maps and Digimap to look at the development of the area through the 19th and 20th. Centuries noting how they had changed from rural farmland to build up housing and industrial use.
