Pupil Friendly Online Safety Policy.

Our Online Safety Aims

We want everyone - pupils, teachers, and staff - to stay safe online.

We teach how to use devices like phones and tablets safely for learning, playing, and communicating.

We show when and how to report and block concerns.

If something goes wrong, we recognise it quickly, take action, and inform the right people to provide support.

Online Safety Risks - Things to Watch Out For

Content - Coming across rude, hurtful, or frightening things online.

Contact - Communicating with people online who may not be who they claim

Conduct - how someone acts online, such as sharing inappropriate pictures, bullying, or being unkind. Online bullying is treated just like bullying in person.

Commerce - Risks such as unintended purchases in games, exposure to unsafe advertisements, or scams that try to steal your personal details.

Who's responsible for making sure everyone stays safe online?

Everyone. Mrs Harrison- our headteacher, governors, all Staff, parents, volunteers and visitors, and **you!**

Helping Parents Keep You Safe Online

We work with your parents and carers to help them understand online safety.

We send home information, share tips on our school website, and talk about staying safe online at parents' evenings.



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If Something Online Upsets You, tell a trusted adult.

If anything, online makes you feel unsure, upset, or confused, talk to your class teacher.

It's always okay to ask for help. Your parents or carers can also speak to a teacher or the headteacher if they're worried.

Keeping Everyone Safe

Teachers use a system called CPOMS to record any online safety concerns. This helps us keep everyone safe in school.

Teacher Training

Our teachers are trained to keep children safe online. They receive this training when they start and have regular updates to stay aware of online risks and how to deal with them.

If School Computers Are Inappropriately Used.

If someone uses school computers or the internet inappropriately, the school will take action based on how serious it is. In serious cases, the police may be informed.

Mobile Phones at School

You're allowed to bring a mobile phone, but it must be given to your teacher or the school office when you arrive. It will be returned at the end of the day. A parent or carer must sign a permission form first.

When Your Device Might Be Checked at School

If we think a device has been used to harm someone, break school rules, or show something inappropriate or illegal, the headteacher may ask to search it. If something serious is found, the device might be kept and the police could be contacted.

Remember, if you are feeling unsafe online, you can tell, block, and report.
